What a difference a few weeks can make! Since setting sail a mere 14 days ago, our teaching crew and young passengers have become seasoned sailors— we are now cruising along smoothly. We have established our rituals and routines. In classrooms, teachers have been building rapport and developing their classroom community. In the cafeteria, students have learned the expectations for purchasing their lunches, recycling their nonconsumables, and cleaning up after themselves. Finally, we have been getting more successful each day at dismissing your children back to you efficiently and safely.

Here are a few reminders about school routines and expectations:

**Dismissal:** If your child is going home a different way, <u>we must know this before 2:15.</u> We cannot make changes after that time! To change how your child goes home, send a note with your child's teacher AND email our receptionist, Noel Day: noel.day@stjohns.k12.fl.us.

**Bikers:** All Bikers MUST have a helmet or they will not be allowed to leave the school campus with their bike. They will need to walk home or have you pick them up.

**Parent Pick-up:** You are not allowed to park back by the bike racks and pick your child up at that location. This area is for busses only!

**Dress Code:** We are encouraging all students to wear our school uniform—polo-style shirts in red, green, or white and khaki or black bottoms. <u>Please check that your child is conforming to district dress code</u>: shorts and skirts must not be shorter than 4 inches above the knee and sleeveless tops with thin straps are not allowed. We have had to give some students verbal reminders of these rules.

plain how that little packet of ketchup is part of a much bigger picture. Because of the new Federal Meal Patterns, which closely regulate nutrition and prices, we are not permitted to set out ketchup for the "taking" unless it is on the At this time, the *National* School Lunch Program and the USDA has put strict guidelines on food that goes out of the school cafeterias.

Nutrient Analysis including calorie count, fat grams, and cost of food, are only some of the factors that need to be considered since Congress finalized this bill in March.

However, I can allow students to purchase ketchup as an ala carte item on days that it is not part of the school meal. Condiments such as ketchup may be purchased for 25 cents per loz serving). Students must have the required amount of funds to pay for items that are not on the menu for serving on a particular day.

I realize this may seem so trivial, but I am not permitted to bend the rules. These rules must be strictly en-



forced by our district, the state of Florida and our country.
